Saints Peter and Paul

On Wednesday June 29th we celebrate the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul. Why do we celebrate them together? Although they were executed in different years, it is believed that they were executed on the same day under the Emperor Nero and buried in Rome.

St. Peter and St. Paul were two very different individuals and didn't always

agree on everything. St. Peter was originally known as Simon and was a fisherman by trade. Jesus called upon Peter and his brothers Andrew, James and John to follow him. (Matthew 4:19) Jesus gave him the name Peter (Petrus in Latin) which means Rock. (Matthew 16: 16-20). Peter was a true follower of Jesus but like all of us showed that his faith was imperfect by denying Jesus three time. (Luke 22:56-62). Peter travelled throughout the world preaching the word of God. He spent his last years in Rome, leading the Church through persecution and was martyred in year 64 A.D. He was crucified upside-down at his own request, because he said he was not worthy to die as Christ had died.

St. Paul was not always a follower of Jesus. He was a Roman citizen and Jewish Pharisee, named Saul who persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Acts 7:58 shows Saul (later known at Paul) was present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen, the first of Jesus' followers to be put to death because of his faith. Saul's conversion came in a dramatic way (Acts 9:1-19). He then became known as Paul and traveled around, what was known as the Roman Empire, spreading the word of God and establishing Christian communities. Paul was beheaded in the year 67 A.D. (because he was a Roman citizen he could not be crucified). The many letters he wrote during his travels form the bulk of the New Testament.

Like Peter we sometimes make mistakes along the way but find the forgiveness and compassion of Our Lord. As difficult as it can be we need to follow in St. Paul's footsteps with a real zeal and fire for proclaiming the word of God and not be afraid to stand up for our Catholic Faith.
