St. Kateri Tekakwitha



Born in a Mohawk village of Ossernenon, on the south side of the Mohawk River in presentday New York State, she contracted smallpox in an epidemic; her family died and her face was scarred. She converted to Catholicism at

age 19, when she was baptized and given the Christian name Kateri in honor of Catherine of Siena. Refusing to marry, she left her village and moved for the remaining five years of her life to the Jesuit mission village of Kahnawake, south of Montreal on the St.

Lawrence River in Few France, now Canada. Kateri Tekakwitha took a vow of perpetual virginity. Upon her death at age 24, witnesses said that her scars vanished minutes later, and her face appeared radiant and beautiful. She is the 4th Native American to be venerated in the Catholic Church and the first to be canonized.

Various miracles and supernatural events are attributed to her intercession. She is the Patron Saint of loss of parents, people in exile, Native Americans, as well as egologists, environmentalists.

Born: 1656, Baptized: April 18, 1676, Died: April 17, 1680, Beatified: June 22, 1980, by Pope John Paul II, Canonized: October 21, 2012 by Pope Benedict XVI. She is known as "Lily of the Mohawks".
