The Nativity of the Virgin Mary

Although we do not know when Mary was born, we have celebrated her on September 8th since the 6th century. September was chosen as that is when the Eastern Church begins its new liturgical year.

The Virgin Mary was born to Anna and Joachim in the city of Nazareth. They had been childless and fasted and p rayed for a child initially wondering if they had displeased God since he had not blessed them with a child. An angel appeared to Anna and revealed that she and Joachim would be blessed with a child and prophesied that all generations would honor their future child: "The Lord has heard your prayer, and you shall conceive and shall bring forth, and your seed shall be spoken of in all the world." Mary grew up surrounded by their constant love and faith. Although Anna & Joachim are not mentioned in the bible most of what we know of them is from church legend. The Protoevangelium of James speaks of Mary's upbringing and her family. (This document can be found on the internet and is not part of the bible.)

Saint Augustine connects Mary's birth with Jesus' saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and shine forth In the light of her birth. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed. We know from the bible and history what an important role Mary has and still does play in our lives. Her message to us has consistently been 'PRAY THE ROSARY'. With the trials and tribulations we are facing today, we need to heed the Virgin Mary's request.
